# Information about pricing

#### When searching about shakuhachi flutes, the matter of prices is quite surprising.

From cheap plastic shakuhachi priced about  $40 \in \text{up}$  to several thousands euro flutes...! It is then difficult to understand what makes the value of a shakuhachi and how can a bamboo flute be so expensive.

Despite it's simple or even rough appearance, the traditional method of making shakuhachi flutes require high skills, a lot of time and years of experience and studies.

First of all, the base material isn't easy to obtain and represents already a cost in work or money. Most of the makers living in urban areas need to buy well selected and cured bamboo from suppliers (a good piece pricing between 100 and 200 €). Even with access to a big madake bamboo forest, it's still not easy to find the good pieces fullfilling all the requirements in terms of shape, size, age, node repartition...

The making process then is very complex because the bore (inner tube) is unregular and needs a lot of precise adjustments to achieve a good well balanced and tuned instrument; it is very rare to find a piece of bamboo with the perfect bore design. This work is purely empirical and needs to be done with prudence and at a slow pace.

#### Price criteria

The acoustical qualities of a shakuhachi are of course essential. The tuning, power, tone colour and general balance of the instrument are it's main qualities. But there are also a number of rather aesthetical criterias that are counting (especially in Japan) and even sometimes prevailing on the acoustical ones. For instance, the type of bamboo used, its number of nodes (ideally 7) and their repartition, the shape or curve of the bamboo, the weigth and aspect of the root end...

Some finishings can also raise the value of a shakuhachi such as rattan bindings, the use of expensive material like ivory, silver or gold. The Japanes lacquer *Urushi* is also an expensive and delicate material to work with.

The reputation of the maker is also very important. There are some high ranking shakuhachi like the stradivarius in the violin world.

#### My personnal pricing policy

Over the years, my prices have raised as the quality of my work improved. I came up with fixed prices for the beginner's shakuhachi made from straight bamboo poles and want to keep affordable prices for beginners.

As for traditional shakuhachi, their quality is allways improving as their prices will do. I rely on the feedbacks I get from professional players or makers and my teacher to value my work.

The overall quality of my instruments has improved over the last years but my prices were kept untuched. Since over a year, the feedbacks I could get from my master, other professional makers I've met in Japan or shakuhachi events and several professional players pushed me to a re-evaluation of my prices in 2020 for both making and repairing to be in accordance with the quality of my work, my involvement in the study of shakuhachi and its making and the recognition I get from professionals.

# Repairs

Any price quote for restoring a shakuhachi can be done only after expertise and complete testing of the instrument. The prices above should then be considered as indicative. I am able to give the final price only with the shakuhachi in my hands.

## Cracks repairing

Inlaid bindings with rattan finishing: 50 € / binding

 Inlaid silver pledges : 35 € / pledge (for cracks between roots only)
